The students will have to prepare a detailed report on learnings from the fieldwork based on the guidelines provided by the teacher. The students will obtain the certificate of the work done/things learnt from the authority of the concerned organization. The faculty mentor may pay a surprise visit to the student.

During the fieldwork, the student will maintain a diary keeping a note of work done and things learnt. The diary will not only contain notes but also sketches/pictures/photos. Ediary and daily submission may be encouraged.
