If yes, give a brief description and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)	<p>The Management Information System is a tool that integrates various functions and the stakeholders associated with an organization. Accordingly, in Sardar Patel University MIS is implemented efficiently for the benefit of various stakeholders including students, teaching and administrative staff, internal and external stakeholders and can be accessed as per the requirement. Students have to apply online for the admission. A student's entry to final exit can be completely tracked through a unique ID number provided to her/him at the time of registration. Invitation of application for admissions, prospectus for various programs, online admissions, syllabus, evaluation details, provisional mark sheet generation, degree awarding details, etc. are integrated through online developed system. Students related information like their academic performance, differently abled students, gender and caste, are generated by the system. Such information is useful in decision making processes like creating appropriate infrastructure to facilitate the students need belonging to various categories. Statistics generated by the MIS is used in monitoring the progress of the students during the program. The monitoring of the number of students in various</p>

programs and accordingly the decisions regarding the continuation of the program at the institute level are done. Online process of scholarship from various government and other agencies is facilitated by the university, and the information thus generated is used to analyze the details of the beneficiaries. Examination registration forms are filled online having details like the available subjects and elective subjects chosen by each student. Departments and Colleges download the hall ticket of the students appearing in the exam, which in parallel provides statistics related to the students for the examination section. Information acquired through the examination form are used to plan and execute the entire examination process. Transparency in the examination process is assured using double barcode on the answer books to keep the identity of the student anonymous. The processing and preparation of results is fully automated and integrated with MIS. Information related to the number of students registered, appeared, passed, with various grades is drawn and it is used for further analysis of the results. Students can download provisional mark sheet from the portal. Application for seeking degree is done online. Lastly the exit formality is processed through MIS, which is used to trace the student progression. Details related to the staff members are fed into MIS like salary, leaves, and faculty welfare which are integrated and managed through information system. Information related to the service of various staff members is used to analyze the status of faculty availability in each program viz a viz student ratio, vacancies, etc. Data related to gender is used to analyze the gender audit among students and various categories of staff. Various financial and accounting details are integrated through efficient MIS. Procurement and purchases are routed through computer aided procedures. Various circulars and notifications for various stakeholders are updated on the website in time. The website of the university is so designed that any information required can be had easily.

### 1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained
<p>A standard feedback mechanism exists at the department and the university level where questionnaire is prepared based various aspects like curricula, teaching-learning-evaluation, administrative facilitation and support etc. Feedback collected from students, teachers, parents and alumni by individual department of the university is analysed using standard statistical methods. The analysis is focused on identifying the strengths and weaknesses of the students, teachers and the departments in its academic performance. It is used to keep a track of the impact of the changes made in the curricula, teaching-learning-evaluation methods etc. based on previous feedback. Analysis of the student feedback is particularly useful in identifying the slow learners, the problems faced by majority of students in learning due to inadequate teaching-learning resources and teaching methods. Remedial classes and counseling sessions for the slow learners are arranged after the regular classes. Issues related to teaching are addressed by the head of the department through consultation and sincere efforts are made to fix the problems. Analysis of the feedback from</p>

parents and alumni helps to know their perception about the department as an academic unit, to trace any lacunae in the academic and administrative set up, to explore the possibilities of active engagement of the parents and alumni in the further development of the department and university.

In each post-graduate department, there is a mentoring system involving teachers of the departments. The teacher is assigned responsibility for a batch of post-graduate students to monitor their attendance and support them in their learning. They also help students to address their issues regarding learning resources, participation in co-curricular activities, preparations for competitive exams, etc. The mentors also help to resolve the socio-economic problems of the students. This helps in developing a cordial relation between teachers and the students. It has been experiencing by mentors that their involvement contributes towards the holistic development of the students and making their studies in the university pleasant and memorable. Career guidance is also given in this system. This system in the post-graduate departments bridges the gap between students and the teaching community. This system is envisaged as one of the key factors in the performance of the students. The university teachers give a patience listening to the needs and expectations of the mentee and give suitable advice and fruitful guidance. Also, they clarify the goals and aspirations of the mentee. The mentors role is to guide, give advice, and support the mentee. The mentor focuses on the need of the students and regular updates about the student progress. It is a big challenge to encourage, exploring the new ideas and



opportunities of the mentee. All mentors can always do more for the benefit of students. The mentor establishes consistent communication with the students and counsels them wherever necessary and closely monitors the overall development of the students. They continuously monitor, counsel, guide, and motivate the students in all academic matters. A mentor plays a vital role in nurturing students and has a positive impact on students' persistence and academic achievement. A mentee can approach his/her mentor for both educational and personal guidance even during off office hours. It is conducted to help the students to strengthen their varied capabilities and to build an interpersonal relationship between the faculties and students. It is a reciprocity activity. It helps to mentor and mentee to reconnect to the people in our own organization and become re-energized. During the mentoring process student get knowledge about ins and outs of the university, his/her area, and his/her profession, also got deepened self-knowledge and self-understanding. Effective mentorship has an overall positive effect on academic achievement, retention, and degree attainment, as well as on career success, career satisfaction, and career commitment in long run. Mentor and mentee have equal importance in the dyad and therefore the well-being of both is essential to a successful outcome. These bridges the professions, organizations, public and private sectors, injecting differing perspectives to enrich the process. The mentor has a chalked-out responsibility to take care of all the mentees to always support them as and when required.

The university has set procedures for judicious distribution and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance of physical, academic and support facilities like laboratory, library, sports complex, computer and classrooms. The University has well established estate section headed by University Engineer along with his team of engineers and other staff looks after various physical facilities. The university has 3 campuses namely university main campus, residential staff colony and satellite campus. The university has more than 30 educational buildings, 324 quarters, 8 hostels and 5 support services buildings. The estate section has been assigned the duty of quarters allotment to its permanent employee as well as students pursuing PhD. For the same estate section invites application through circular and after stipulated time the allotment is done on the basis of rules and regulation framed by syndicate vied item no. 35 dated 6/7/2017. For guest house allotment the university has prescribed form for the allotment and also has approved rates for educational and other than educational purpose. The university has its own University Science and Instrumentation Center (USIC) for maintaining the laboratory equipment. There are some sophisticated equipment which are maintained by the concern companies. In case of costly equipment above 5 lakhs, the university has a policy to procure them from suppliers/ manufacturers on a condition of providing 3 years warranty and 2 years AMC or 5 years warranty after expiry of 5 years warranty provided by suppliers at the time of Installation. Apart from this, the university permits to avail AMCs for sophisticated equipment from the manufacturer. Some of the equipment are maintained by the technical assistance of the departments. Computers and peripherals are maintained by USIC centre. The Director of Physical Education takes care on the utilization of sports facilities. The university has a huge sports complex, which includes indoor games like badminton, table tennis, basketball. The University also has playground where students can play games like football, cricket, volleyball, basket-ball. The university has also constituted a sports committee including syndicate member to decide on the maintenance of the complex and various facilities. The University has central library called Bhaikaka Library along with various departmental library. The central library has librarian and library committee including syndicate members that looks after various policy decisions, procurement and maintenance of the books in library. The central library has been utilizing the SOUL 2.0 software procured by INFLIBNET for its function. The library has its own prescribed rules and regulation regarding membership, borrowing of books and fine. The technical assistants of library, computer center and INFLIBNET carry out troubleshooting and maintenance of SOUL software. The computer center carries out the installation and maintenance of the software in all the department and sections of the university. The computer center also maintains the networking and the internet facility in the entire university.

[1] Decentralization of financial decision making by delegation of power: For effective implementation of teaching and research program, quick decisions are needed for acquiring essential items needed routinely. Keeping this in mind, each Head of Department, all sections are given power to take decision on the purchase and ordering of chemicals, laboratory items, stationary items, other teaching material to the tune of Rs. 25,000/- to Rs.50,000/- after inviting quotations. The Vice-Chancellor has been given power to approve the purchase order upto Rs. 2,00,000/- with due quotation process. The mandatory procedure for quotation is followed. The item costing above Rs. 2,00,000/- are purchased after inviting open tenders and taking the approval of equipment committee, FE and syndicate. [2] The academic and executive decisions are taken by committees where teachers and students representatives are members: Board of studies in each subject of discipline is composed of teachers and has statutory power to consider the matters related to preparation of syllabus, course structure, mode of continuous evaluation, reviewing the examination papers, preparing the panel of examiners, etc. and approving them. Similarly, two Head of the Department, some faculty members are part of the various university authorities such as syndicate, senate, academic council, etc. Their inputs are considered before

taking final decision.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

1.Development of a Green Belt in a newly established remote campus of the Biosciences Department. What was a barren land in 2006 during the inception of

the Department in the new campus, was converted to a lush green belt, rich in Biodiversity by the efforts of the Faculty and Students. In the last decade, the department has developed a forest like a green campus with extraordinary biodiversity: more than 200 trees consisting of more than 80 trees species number of flowering non-flowering herbs, shrubs, more than 100 insect species including 75 recorded butterfly species, 65 spider species. The avian diversity as recorded on the dept. amounts to 75 species in the last five years. Specific programmes efforts in the conservation of birds, insects, snakes and plants have been carried out on regular bords. 2. Not merely Tree plantation but Tree Nurturing activities are taken up on the campus. 3. A Eucalyptus Park has been created in one of the plots of the University. 4. Encouraging the paperless processes through e-communication for academic and administrative activities - mainly declaration of Result, making an online announcement of the exam timetable, online availability of mark sheets and sending SMS to students for answer books observation are some of the activities. 5. Encouraging the reuse of stationary (covers, files, folders, using backside for printing etc) for inter-departmental communication. 6. Encouraging celebrations (World Sparrow Day, Ozon Day, Earth Day, Forest Trail etc) to raise awareness and consciousness about values, traditions and heritage. 7. The Departmental buildings are declared as a Tobacco-free zone to reduce carbon emission to the environment and to generate health awareness. 8. Swachchhata Abhiyaan has been a regular feature and minimizing the use of plastic is an important message given to all the stakeholders. 9. The students are encouraged to keep enough water pots hanging to make birds drink from. Students and Faculty contribute to donating/volunteering for the Vidyanagar Nature Club.

## 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

The University lays equal emphasis on teaching, research, extension and service-related activities for the overall and holistic growth of the students, the Extension and service activities are conducted throughout the year by independently working units such as Community Radio Station, Community Science Centre, University Museum, University Health Centre and Sanskar Mandal. The Community Radio Station trains and design programmes by the students, for the students and of the students by regularly broadcasting Radio Channel FM 90.4MHz. The programmes are of two types, one is University student-related information and the second taps the talent of students in making programmes on academic, social-cultural aspects. Talks by the specialists are arranged to address the concerns of stress and health-related issues. A district-level Community Science Centre is hosted on the campus under the sponsorship of the Gujarat Council on Science and Technology (GUJCOST), Gandhinagar. The main underlined objective of the Centre is to take the Science to the People and attract People to Science. Therefore several programmes formal and informal, in the form of Talks, Summer Camps, Hands-on Training, Demonstration of Scientific Principles, Workshops, Film Shows, Field Visits, Interactive Sessions etc. are

organized. The students, especially school children are being reminded of important scientific discoveries, inventions and contribution of reputed scientists by celebrating Days of National and International significance. The students are encouraged through awarding prizes for their performance in competitions. The children are encouraged to take Science as their interest subject and take up small research themes to participate in District State/National level competitions of the Children's Science Congress. The University has a Museum of its own that preserves historical and cultural heritage and the cultural legacy of Gujarat and India. It promotes awareness among the citizens and especially young students through awareness/orientation/exhibition/competition programmes. The University promotes social-cultural activities for the University employees and their families through a Sanskar Mandal, an organization run by the University Staff. The Mandal runs an Inhouse Nursery (Balwadi) for the children of University employees and other citizens. Sanskar Balwadi also organizes competitions such as Fancy Dress, Hair Style, Mehndi, and Garba Competition at Taluka and District Levels. It provides nutritious food to children and has swings and slides for the amusement of the children on its large compound. It has fine equipment for the development of various skills.
