- Q. 2 B Delineate the character-sketch of Gobar as a young man in conflict (20) with the feudal structure of erstwhile Indian rural society.
- Q. 3 A Critically appreciate the poems 'A Strange Man' and 'Under Stones' (20) by offering textual illustrations.

OR

Q. 3 B Comment upon the theme of the poem 'Winter Morning Mist' on (20) the basis of your reading of it.

Q. 4 A Discuss how Rushdie, in Midnight's Children, offers an alternative (20) history of India with a view to combat the centripetal nationalist forces trying to hegemonise the pluralistic Indian society.

- Q. 4 B The gradual disintegration of Midnight Children's Conference is a (20) metaphor for the inefficiency of its political leaders to come up with a viable political vision of integrated national identity. Explain.
- Q. 5 A Critically appreciate the poems 'Questions' and 'A Meditation' in (20) the light of your reading of them.

- Q. 5 B Write an essay on Kamala Das as a female poet offering her critique (20) of patriarchal Indian society on the basis of her prescribed poems.
- Q. 6 A Discuss the debate between Hinduism and Jainism on the issue of (20) violence and its deeper ramifications as offered in *Bali: The Sacrifice*.

Q. 6 B Attempt the character-sketch of the King as portrayed by Karnad in (20) the play Bali: The Sacrifice.
